

1.0. INTRODUCTION

This is a report commissioned by the Department of Research Services at the Parliament of Uganda on a Comprehensive Study on Achievements, Challenges, and Experiences of Women Members of Uganda's 10th Parliament.

1.2 Specific objectives of the Study

The specific objectives of the study were:

- 1. To ascertain the achievements and contributions made by Women Members of Uganda's 10th Parliament in areas of: Law making, Oversight and Representation.
- 2. To compare and contrast the contributions of women MPs in the above areas vis-a-vis that of the male MPs;
- 3. To identify the challenges faced by Women Members in the course of executing their legislative functions.
- 4. To examine the implications on the training needs for Women Members of Uganda's 11th Parliament.

1.3 Scope of the report

The study focused on the performance of female members of the 10th Parliament of Uganda as compared to their male counterparts. MPs were assessed in the three areas of performance, namely: Plenary, Committee, and Constituency where applicable including other areas of performance such as on oversight and budget appropriation.

2.0 KEY FINDINGS

This section deals with the findings of the study.

2.1 Overall Composition of 10th Parliament

2.1.1 Gender

Over the five years, the representation of women steadily increased. In June 2016, women representation in the 10th Parliament stood at 140 (32%) against the 287 (68%) male MPs while in March 2021, the number stood at 159 (35%) against the 296 (65%) male MPs (refer to Figure below).




Figure 1: Composition of the 10th Parliament by Gender

2.2 Profile of Women Members of the 10th Parliament

2.2.1 Political party affiliation

As of 11th May, 2021, the National Resistance Movement (NRM) continued to numerically dominate the 10th Parliament with 307 (70.9%) MPs, followed by the official opposition party in Par-

liament - the Forum for Democratic Change (FDC) - with 37(8.6%) MPs, then the Democratic Party (DP) represented by 15(3.2%) MPs, Uganda People's Congress (UPC) constituted 7(1.6%) MPs and one MP representing JEEMA (0.2%). The independent MPs were 67 (14.7%). The party composition excludes the 10 UPDF representatives and the 12 ex-officio members.

1. Age bracket

The Age Bracket is classified according to birth cohorts. These include Baby Boomers (1946 – 1964), Generation X (1965 – 1980), Millennials (1981 – 1996), and the Silent Generation (1928 – 1945). Female MPs of the 10th Parliament who belonged to each category were Baby Boomers (30), Generation X (94), Millennials (23) and the Silent Generation (1).

2. Education

Regarding Education, those with a Bachelor's Degree were (73), Certificate (3), Diploma (6), Master's Degree (65), Not available (2).

3. Profession

Agriculture (2), Consultant (2), Economist (2), Journalist (5) Musician (1), Accountant (12), Administrator (17), Banker (1), Business Woman (7), Civil Engineer (1), Engineer (1), Environmentalist (3), Fine Artist (1), Forester (1), Gender Specialist (1), Health Worker (1), Hotelier (1), Human Resource and Administration(1), ICT Expert (2), Law Enforcer (1), Lawyer/Advocate (5), Legislator (4), Management (1), Medical Doctor (1), Midwife (1), Not Available (2), Oil and Gas Expert (1), Politician (10), Procurement and Logistics (2), Public Health (1), Scientist (1), Security Officer (1), Social Scientist (2), Social Worker (19), Soldier (1), Teacher (35).

From the above categorisation, Teachers were the majority (35) followed by Social Workers (19) and Administrators (17). The 10th Parliament also had 2 female Engineers with one Civil.

It must be noted however that these professional descriptions are not accurate in some cases where some MPs chose to define themselves as Legislators (4), in the process not giving us their professional background. The classification however gives a general picture of the professional background of the female Members of the 10th Parliament.

2.3 Legislative experience

PERFORMANCE OF WOMEN MPs of the 10th PARLIAMENT vis-à-vis that of MALE MPs/ MP PERFORMANCE BY GENDER:

The Performance of female MPs in respect to representation of the citizens' concerns in the House increased from 44.5 to 45.5 percentile score in the 3rd and 4th Sessions respectively.

1. In Plenary

MPs who performed as excellent in Plenary based on 5th Session data were 75 out of 440. Out of the 75 MPs, only 18 were female and 57 were male. Those who performed at very good were 72. Out of these, 21 were female and 51 males. The majority (163) performed poorly in the plenary of the 5th Session with 63 females and 100 males.

It should also be noted that a total of 193 (49%) MPs out of 440 of the 10th Parliament were returned to the 11th Parliament with 63 Female and 130 Males. A total of 244 (55%) MPs were not returned with 84 female and 160 Males.

2. In Committees

In here, performance was based on the 3rd Session of the 10th Parliament Data. Those who per-

formed excellent were 14 with 5 female and 9 males. Those who performed at very good were 55 with 14 female and 41 males. The majority of the MPs in the 5th Session of the 10th Parliament performed at Fair (136) in committees with 50 females compared to 86 males.

Assessing of the constituency parameter was introduced based on 4th Session data. Only one

male MP performed at Excellent in the constituency with no female at excellent. The majority of the female MPs (89) performed poorly at the constituency level. Incidentally this number coincides with the number of female MPs who were not returned to parliament hoverer those who performed as Poor at constituency and not returned were only 29. If you add the fair parameter the females who were not retuned add up to 64. Only 16 females performed at very good at the constituency and compared to 36 males at the same rating. Of the 16 females who performed at very good at constituency, only 8 were returned to the 11th Parliament.

It is however interesting to note that 9 MPs who performed poorly at Plenary and Constituency were returned to the 11th Parliament.

2.4 Leadership

From the above table in can be seen that women in leadership in the 10th Parliament were 16 (39%) while the male positions were 25 (61%).

Occupation of Positions of Leadership by Women MPs in Parliament

Based on 4th Session of the 10th Parliament Data, 38.3% of the position of the chairpersons and vice chairpersons were women. As shown in the table below:

ministers (cabinet and shadow) with a score above Excellent that is 80 were Achieng Sarah Opendi (93), Seninde Rosemary Nansubuga (88), Kyambadde Amelia Anne (86), Aceng Jane Ruth (86), Bakireke Nambooze Betty (86), Atim Beatrice Anywar (83), Moriku Joyce Kaducu (80) and Amongi Betty Ongom (80).

Below is a highlight of women in leadership where 33.77% of the Cabinet Ministers were women while 34.2% of the Shadow Ministers were women.

2.5 Other Specific Indicators

Number/proportion of female vs. male MPs who presented the views of their constituents/raised new issues/ and debated the important challenges facing Uganda.

In the 3rd Session, we had 201MPs raise issues of national concern, of which 69 were female and 132 were Male. This compares with 5th Session where only 119 MPs raised an issue of national concern with 38 females and 81 males.

7) Number/proportion of female vs. male MPs as attendance of district council meetings, having an office/ point of contact for the MP, having a Political Assistant and personal projects carried out by the Member of Parliament that are neither funded by national or local governments, nor by NGOs.

Based on 4th Session data, out of the 149 Female MPs, only 26 had a Female Political Assistant compared to 80 Female MPs who had male political Assistants. Female MPs whose information was not available about political assistants was 34, while 9 were not applicable meaning they were either representing a special interest group or the nation at large.

This compares with 291 Male MPs out of which only 9 had female political assistants compared to 205 who had male political assistants, 61 Male MPs having no information about their political assistants and 16 being not applicable.

Regarding attending any meeting at the district council, 345 MPs attended with 116 Female and 229 Males. Seventy (70) MPs did not attend any meeting at the district with 22 Females and 48 Males.

In terms of those MPs who had no office at the constituency we had 7 MPs and all were male. However, for those where information was not available about presence of offices in the constituency were 91 with 38 Females and 52 males. Those to which an office was not applicable such as UPDF or interest groups were 22 with 7 females and 15 Males.

8) Number/proportion of female vs. male MPs that were found to be in conflict with procedures of Parliament.

Based on 4th Session data, out of 460 MPs, 66 were found to be in conflict with different aspects of Parliamentary Rules of Procedure. Two Male MPs were referred to the disciplinary committee, while Only 273 MPs cited specific rules of Procedure to guide the House giving a positive score of 40.7. According to the Hansard of the session under review, the "point of order" rule was cited by 221 MPs during the 4th Session. Exemplary Leadership performance in the 4th Session was very good with a positive score of 65.725%.

9) Those who introduced an amendment during debate of bills at committee stage

These were 40 MPs in the 3rd Session with 31 Males compared to 9 females. This compares with 65 MPs in the 5th Session with 14 Females compared to 51 Males.

Examples of bills where female MPs introduced amendments:

- 1) THE DATA PROTECTION AND PRIVACY BILL, 2015
- 2) THE INVESTMENT CODE BILL, 2017
- 3) THE MENTAL HEALTH BILL, 2014
- 4) THE MINIMUM WAGES BILL, 2015
- 5) THE PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES BILL, 2018
- 6) THE SUGAR BILL, 2016

3.0 ACHIEVEMENTS, CONTRIBUTION

The key achievements of the 10th Parliament of Uganda include:

- 1) Increased legislation by enacting 118 laws.
- 2) Made landmark legislations and processed more people-centred Bills such as amendment of Article 102(b) of the Constitution, Enactment of the Coffee Bill and the National Health Insurance Bill, among others.
- 3) Enhanced political participation of the citizens in the political process through the Amendment of the Parliamentary Elections Act to provide for representation for the elderly and removal of the lower age limit of presidential and LCV chairperson candidates.
- 4) Ensured minority groups in Parliament such as the Opposition and the independents contributed to parliamentary business. The 10th Parliament remained united beyond party lines.
- 5) Increased visibility of Parliament through Parliament Week, Parliament Outreach programmes and the Speaker's Open Days.
- 6) Ensured timely response to emergencies such as the COVID-19 pandemic, the locusts, and landslides in Bududa and Kasese districts, among others.
- 7) Timely passing of the National Budget, within the timelines of the Public Finance Management Act, 2015.
- 8) Ensured compliance of the National Budget with the National Development Plan and with Gender and Equity responsiveness.
- 9) Hosted the 64th Commonwealth Parliamentary Conference (CPC).
- 10) Established the Rebecca Alitwala Kadaga Institute of Parliamentary Studies (RAKIPS) by an Act of Parliament.

4.0 CHALLENGES AND RECOMMENDATIONS

5.0 CONCLUSION

From the review of the above data, it can be concluded that the level of performance of the female legislators in the 10th parliament was best in Plenary with 18 female legislators performing at Excellent and 21 performing at Very good, followed by performance at Committee with 5 female legislators performing at Excellent and 14 performing at Very good. The poorest performance for female legislators was at Constituency where there was no Excellent performance, followed by 16 female legislators who performed at Very good. The majority female legislators (89) performed at poor in the constituency, compared with 69 in plenary and 19 at committee.
